Course Objective

This course aims to equip you with analytical tools to model economic decision-making, market outcomes, and the effects of economic policies. You will learn to formalize economic reasoning into simple models to explain agent decisions, as well as how economic conditions and policies influence individual choices and market results. Moreover, this course will also serve as a foundation for advanced electives (e.g., Economics of Markets, Competition and Strategy, Environmental Economics, Economics of Health, Game Theory, International Microeconomics, and Sports Economics).

Textbook

This class will use **Intermediate Microeconomics and Its Application, 13th Edition, by Walter Nicholson and Christopher Snyder (hereafter NS)**, Cengage Publication. There are three options to get your textbook:

- Option 1: Get an **eTextbook**. This is the easiest electronic version to access. You can get it by clicking “[\(1\) eTextbook: Intermediate Microeconomics and Its Applications](#)” on Canvas.
- Option 2: Use **eChapters** by Cengage’s MindTap Platform. This version also has access to e-chapters. You can get it by clicking “[\(2\) MindTap Platform with eChapters](#)” on Canvas.
- Option 3: Get a **hard copy**. You can obtain the current edition (13th) or a previous edition from Amazon or other vendors. The 12th and 11th editions are 99.9% as good as the latest edition.
- Price comparison: eTextbook < MindTap < hardcopy (see prices [here](#)). MindTap is likely only appealing to students who have other classes on MindTap and choose to buy a “Cengage Unlimited” subscription.

Grading

- Grades for this course will be calculated based on:
 - In-class quizzes 200 points
 - Group presentations 80 points (40 points x 2)

- In-class quizzes:
 - While the quizzes are unscheduled pop quizzes, typically, I give quizzes almost every class.

- **Re-do opportunity:** For all quizzes, students will have an opportunity to redo them and score another 80% on the improved amount:
 - If total = 5 pts, you get 0 initially and 5 in redo, then you will get $0 + 5 \cdot 0.8 = 4$ pts
 - If total = 5 pts, you get 4 initially and 5 in redo, then you will get $4 + 1 \cdot 0.8 = 4.8$ pts
- I do not offer late quizzes. However, students are encouraged to submit a redo (with 80% credit). Also, I will drop everyone's lowest 25% of quizzes.
- **Group presentations:**
 - You will collaborate with your group to prepare and deliver the presentation in class.
 - If you miss the first group presentation, you can join two groups in the following round.
- **Exam replacement policy:**
 - Everyone has an off day occasionally. A later exam with better performance can replace earlier exams. But an earlier exam shall not replace a later one.
 - E.g., if your exams are 160, 180, 200, they will be adjusted to 200, 200, 200.
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- **Late policy:**
 - Students are expected to understand the consequences of missing quizzes and exams.
 - If a student needs accommodation for an exam or presentation, I will try to accommodate if a student makes a request in advance. Athletes needing accommodation due to away games are expected to have their advisor notify me in advance.
 - For unanticipated emergencies (e.g., power and internet outages, natural disasters), you can request accommodation as long as you notify me promptly before the deadline. You are expected to keep supporting records and submit them later for paperwork.
- **Attendance and absence**
 - If you need to miss a class and would like to follow up about course material, please let me know by using a “**Notification of Absence**” before class.
- **Re-grading policy:**
 - If you request re-grading of a specific question on an exam, note that the TA might review the question you requested and all other questions in the exam.
- **AI policy:**
 - Using generative AI (e.g., ChatGPT) is allowed in this class for some items but requires **disclosure**.
 - You can use AI for the following: group presentations and any type of re-do.
